What is the Message? By Kent Frerichs

Governor Daugaard offered his budget proposal, with 10% across the board cuts, to the South Dakota Legislature. This 10% cut to education would amount to about \$60 million dollars. This would be on top of the fact that South Dakota Law requires an annual increase to K-12 State Aid of 3% or the Consumer Price Index (CPI), whichever is less. That should have been an increase last year of 1.3% and this year 1.2%. This should have been an increase of about \$15 million dollars. These combined cuts of 12.5% to education would set funding back at least six years. South Dakota has ranked 50th among the 50 states for the level of state money appropriated to State Aid for Education. South Dakota also is ranked #1 in the nation for low wages for teachers, #1 in the nation for the rate of juvenile incarceration, #1 in the nation for working mothers, and #1 in the nation for the amount of student debt for post secondary education.

Certainly every segment of government may have some areas where savings can and should be made. However, a reckless slashing of our state's

constitutional obligation to adequately fund education is not justified. If these drastic cuts are implemented, what message does South Dakota send? Does South Dakota feel that funding education is just another expense? Or should it be thought of as an investment in a positive future? What message is being sent to our students, parents, educators, business and industry? What will the impact be on "Elective Courses" such as Agricultural Education? How will post secondary technical colleges and four year colleges be affected? How can South Dakota's economic development be positive in the future if the budget is going to be balanced on the backs of our students and education?

What is the message that should be delivered to the Daugaard administration and the Legislature? First I believe the message should be that education should not be cut. Secondly, I believe that the message should be that the budget should be brought into balance over a period of at least three years. Third, I believe that the message should be that the state

should use their reserves for the purpose that they were established. The Governor has said that you cannot spend money you do not have. This is true. However, the state does have the money. The reserves are taxpayers' dollars. The state has more than \$700 million dollars in reserves. More than \$100 million of that is readily available for the benefit of our state's future. It makes no sense for the state to hoard away taxpayer's dollars and then ask local governments to raise property taxes to make up for the state's drastic cuts. The reserves were first established to provide a cushion for times when revenues came in short of projections.



Fall 2010 Student Teachers - What Next?

Michael Bos, originally from Steen, Minnesota, recently completed his student teaching experience in Agriculture Education at Garretson High School in Garretson, South Dakota. While there, he taught grades 9th – 12th. The 9th grade class was taught as a traditional agriculture class. Grades 10-12 were taught as independent study type courses including Biotechnology, Welding, Ag Processing, Entrepreneurship, Natural Resources, Small Engines, and Landscape Design. Michael also supervised FFA activities and events, and assisted with students' SAE projects. Course Description

The course is designed to prepare cooperating teachers within Career & Technical Education, specifically, agricultural education and family and consumer sciences. Supervision of student teachers is an essential component of teacher preparation, and as such, the roles of student teacher, cooperating teacher, university supervisor, and state department of education will be analyzed. Mentoring strategies, evaluation and feedback models and collaborative teaching approaches will also be discussed. An opportunity will be provided to address potential areas of concern regarding teacher preparation.

Who Should Attend?

Secondary Agriculture or Family & Consumer Sciences Teachers: If you have had a student teacher, and would like a refresher on how to improve the experience... OR, if you've never had a student teacher, but would be interested in hosting one... **THIS COURSE IS FOR YOU!**

Generally, student teachers are placed with teachers with 3+ years of experience.

Delivery Method

The course will be a mixed-method delivery to accommodate current teachers and reduce the need for extra travel & lodging. The course will meet in Brookings, on the SDSU campus, on June 1st & 2nd, then utilize online/distance learning resources throughout the summer. A concluding face-to-face class will be held at SDACTE conference in Pierre (date & times TBD).
